Hazard Mitigation Planning

Hazard mitigation planning reduces loss of life and property by minimizing the impact of disasters. It begins with state, tribal, and local governments identifying natural disaster risks and vulnerabilities that are common in their area. After identifying these risks, these entities develop long-term strategies for protecting people and property from similar events. Mitigation plans are key to breaking the cycle of disaster damage and reconstruction.

Our Planning and Compliance Team has completed the Thurston County Annex and Lewis County Hazard Mitigation Plan to be submitted with each of the counties' Core Plans for the residents in each county. You can review both draft plans on the PUD's website at <u>http://www.thurstonpud.org/</u> <u>projects.htm</u>. Once these plans are approved by State and Federal Emergency Management Agencies, they will allow the PUD to request grant funds for future mitigation projects after an emergency has been declared and funding is made available. Currently, the District received a 2022 FEMA grant to install a generator at the Meadows 690 water system and purchase two portable generators to use during emergencies.

Mitigation initiatives are the PUD's specific actions for mitigating losses and protecting life and property. The initiatives listed below are sorted by priority, determined by a cost-benefit review.

Hazard Addressed	Action & Description
Wildfire	Wildfire Prevention Strategy Develop and implement a District-wide wildfire prevention strategy to remove hazardous vegetative fuels around facilities and retrofit wood framed structures with fire-resistant materials.
Multi Hazard	Pump House Backup Power Generator Installation Install backup power generators to provide customers reliable water supply when the power grid is disrupted.
Multi Hazard	Emergency Manual Operation Well Pumps Evaluate the installation of manual operated pumps at all Group A water systems to provide a low-cost means to access groundwater for domestic use during emergencies with prolonged power outages.

Hazard Addressed	Action & Description
Multi Hazard	Headquarters Building Emergency Response Hub The District's Headquarters building could serve as its emergency operations center. The District will perform studies to determine if the building can be retrofitted to current seismic standards.
Multi Hazard	Remote Monitoring Implement a systemwide remote monitoring system to record water pressure and flow rates, reservoir levels, disinfectant levels, power supply, security, and other parameters. Remote sensors improve the District's detection and response during emergencies.
Severe Weather	Drought Mitigation on Drinking Water Wells Evaluate and implement mitigation to vulnerable wells to determine best action to mitigate water outages due to drought which could include, but not limited to: Deeping or replacing of wells, intertying or consolidating systems to give greater redundancy and replace high-leak sections of distribution.
Multi Hazard	Customer Emergency Preparedness and Mitigation Communications Strategy Implement an emergency preparedness communications and outreach strategy through utility bill inserts. Information campaigns will educate district customers about personal preparedness and disaster resilience.
Earthquake	Reservoir Seismic Valve Installation Install seismic sensors and automatic valves on the District's largest and regionally most important reservoirs. Automatic shut off valves can preserve water in the event of a water main rupture.
Multi Hazard	Communication Plan between Thurston PUD and Thurston County Creating and implementing a communication plan between Thurston County Emergency Response Teams and Thurston PUD.
Earthquake	Tanglewilde-Thompson Place Seismic Water Main Replacement Replace the aging asbestos cement water main with a new modern main to reduce risks of a system rupture from a major earthquake.

2020-2022 Audit Report Results

Annually, the Washington State Auditor's Office (SAO) conducts a Financial Statement Audit for the PUD, and an Accountability audit is performed every other year.

In September, the SAO completed their audit of the PUD's 2022 financial statements. The SAO did not report any significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in our financial reporting.

They also completed an Accountability Audit for 2020-2022. The SAO found the District complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

We look forward to ensuring our financial statements are consistently presented fairly and accurately according to internal policies, Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), as well as state and federal laws and regulations.

The billing statement you receive in November for October charges may reflect higher consumption for those last few days of hot weather in early September. Check the 'Meter Read' portion on the right side of your statement for specific consumption dates.
